

A Flexible Approach

Guided by a parish catechetical leader, parents and their children regularly come together with other families to take part in group meetings that serve as springboards to each unit's content. Through these meetings, parents become more confident, comfortable, and able to share the truth and beauty of the Catholic faith with their children. In their homes, families explore the unit theme at their own pace, supported by the engaging print and digital materials the Christ Our Life Family Catechesis program offers. Alternatively, the remaining sessions can be taught in the parish by grade-level catechists with families returning for another group meeting in approximately one month to prepare for the next part. Use the approach that best serves the needs of your parish families and your resources and priorities.







Family Catechesis Group-Meeting Structure

Parents and their children begin the meeting together in community with other families. After a 15-minute Welcome section, children meet with their grade-level catechists and are guided through a chapter from the Christ Our Life Student Book. The remaining chapters are taught by parents or taught at weekly meetings with a grade-level catechist.

The chapters correspond to the four pillars of the Catechism of the Catholic Church. Visit christourlife.com for a chart showing how the chapters can be grouped to follow this model. Suggestions for other models are offered in the Director Guide.

Welcome 15 minutes

- Group prayer
- Scripture
- Group prayer
- Brief sharing activity to preview the part theme

Children leave for their respective grade-level meeting spaces.

Connect 30 minutes

- Parent-focused exploration of the part theme
- Small-group sharing activities and discussion
- Scripture
- Multimedia

Close 15 minutes

- Wrap-up
- Closing prayer
- Information about the next meeting

After the Group Meeting

Parents complete their meeting 15 minutes before the end of the children's grade-level lesson. This allows time for questions, for conversations between parents, and for parents to pick up their children from their respective grade-level classes.

Conduct Slideshow Presentation

The slides and accompanying scripting are designed to engage both children and their parents. Reduced images of each slide help synchronize the visual and spoken elements of the presentation. Special features appear in sidebars.

Welcome (15 minutes)

The catechetical leader will introduce the theme through prayer, Scripture reading, and a sharing activity or discussion. Program- and parish-specific information will also be shared. After the Welcome section is concluded, your children will leave to join their grade-level catechists to complete the first chapter of the unit.


Connect (30 minutes)

A variety of parent-focused activities engage participants in the content and in fellowship with one another. Parents' understanding of essential faith concepts is bolstered, and they come away from the meeting more confident about passing on the treasure of the Catholic faith when teaching at home and in everyday life.



Close (15 minutes)

The meeting concludes with a wrap-up, a closing prayer, and an opportunity for you to provide participants with information about the next meeting, parish events, or other housekeeping issues.



After the Group Meeting

The meeting ends 15 minutes before the end of the grade-level meetings. This allows time to answer questions and remind parents where to access the resources for at-home lessons and additional online support.

Seasonal Gatherings

On some occasions, the Family Catechesis families and parishioners will have the opportunity to participate in seasonal events. These will take place in the parish after the Advent and Christmas; Lent, Holy Week, and Easter; and year-end group meetings. See pages 19–20 of the Director Guide for more information about the seasonal gatherings.

Resources for At-Home Lessons

The *Christ Our Life* program includes online resources, ready to download and print, that are useful for adapting instruction to an at-home setting.

After the monthly group meeting, parents will be better prepared to guide their children through the chapters in the Student Book. The *Christ Our Life* At-Home Edition provides grade-specific, step-by-step instructions to support parents. The At-Home Edition PDFs can be viewed online or printed.

Interactive Chapter Reviews

The Interactive Chapter Reviews serve as an evaluation tool to help monitor children's progress.

Study Guides

The Study Guides help children review the content of each chapter, including the important vocabulary words. The guides include the page number where each concept appears in the Student Book, so your children can find them if they need to review them more thoroughly.

A Catechetical Leader's Role

As a catechetical leader, you are responding to the call to share the gift of faith with others, even as you deepen your own faith. Know that this Leader Guide, together with the slideshow presentations, multimedia, and online resources, was designed to accompany you every step of the way with abundant resources, practical tips, and ample support.

Fundamental Characteristics of Your Role

As we yearn for the knowledge and skills that help us gently nurture others to experience their faith, we ground our efforts in these fundamentals:

- a well-developed understanding of Catholic Tradition, culture, doctrine, and Scripture
- an ability to treat all children as made in the image of God and worthy of kindness, dignity, and respect
- effective organizational and communication skills
- valuing child safety as evidenced by meeting all diocesan and parish requirements—including training—and ensuring that the catechists with whom you work do likewise



Qualities of an Effective Catechetical Leader

As a catechetical leader, you share your personal faith and humanity. The ability to share authentically requires certain qualities that include

- a desire to grow in your faith and relationship with God
- an awareness of God's grace and the desire to respond to that grace
- a commitment to the Church's liturgical and sacramental life and moral teachings
- a strength of character built on patience, responsibility, confidence, and creativity
- an understanding of the needs and concerns of the catechists, families, and children whom you serve
- a generosity of spirit, respect for diversity, and habit of hospitality and inclusion.

Prepare a Welcoming Environment

When Jesus planned a special meal with his Apostles during Passover, he sent Peter and John ahead of him, saying, "Go and make preparations for us." (Luke 22:8) In the same way, preparing the physical space for faith formation is important. Although you may not be able to choose your meeting space, you can take steps to make it welcoming.

No matter your environment, give families a sense of belonging where they can be comfortable learning and sharing. The best way to support and encourage any group is to have a welcoming spirit. Greet parents and children at the door as they arrive.

- Arrive 20–30 minutes early to prepare the space and to center yourself. If you are rushed and frantic, the participants will feel the same; likewise, if you are calm and relaxed, that tone will be reflected in the room.
- Arrange the chairs so that each has an unobstructed view of the screen on which the slideshow presentation will be projected.
- Place handouts, name tags, or other materials on a table near the entry. Using preprinted name tags will make it easy for you to see at a glance who is not present. Consider affixing the name tags to meeting materials so they can be retrieved by the participants later.
- If possible, make all aspects of your environment consistent from month to month. Parents and children will find comfort in returning to a familiar space.

 Consider providing light snacks and drinks, such as coffee and water, but be aware of any food allergies.

Prayer Center

Arrange a focal point with symbols that express the presence of the Word of God and communicate a sense of the sacred. Set up a prayer center with these supplies:

- small table, prominently placed
- cloth table cover, changed to reflect each liturgical season
- Bible
- small plant or flowers
- one or more of the following: bowl of holy water, crucifix, religious image or statue
- battery-operated candle
