Your Role as Catechetical Leader

Roles for catechetical leaders vary from parish to parish and from diocese to diocese. What is consistent is the challenge of providing guidance, support, and resources for all who take part in your parish's faith formation program. This is true when leading your parish's family catechesis program.

Christ Our Life Family Catechesis combines parish-based group meeting and grade-specific instruction led by trained catechists with at-home lessons guided by parents. You will lead, or designate someone to lead, monthly group meetings with accompanying slideshow presentations, recruit and mentor catechists to teach children in a grade-level group setting, and help parents teach their children additional faith content at home.

Family catechesis is a collaborative effort undertaken by the catechetical leader, parents, children, and catechists together with the wider parish community. Family catechesis strengthens the domestic church and the parish community. Preparation, planning, and communication will help your program be successful. May all you do help others recognize God's presence in all things! Blessings on your endeavor.



Christ Our Life Family Catechesis combines parish-based group meetings and gradespecific instruction that are led by trained catechists at weekly sessions or at home guided by parents.

Monthly Group Meetings

Parents and children begin each meeting together in community with other families. After the Welcome portion, children meet with their grade-level catechists, where they are taught a chapter from the *Christ Our Life* Student Book.

The program leader uses the slideshow presentation to teach parents more about the

part theme during the Connect and Close sections. Parents complete their meeting 15 minutes before their children's grade-level lesson concludes. This allows time for questions, conversations between parents, and time for parents to pick up their children from their grade-level classes.

Welcome (Parents + Children) 15 minutes

Children leave for their respective grade-level lessons.

Connect (Parents Only) 30 minutes

Close (Parents Only) 15 minutes

Ongoing Catechesis

In the weeks after the monthly group meeting, parents catechize their children at home using the *Christ Our Life* Student Book in conjunction with the At-Home Edition. Alternatively, children can return each week and be taught a grade-level catechist. The At-Home Edition provides parents with easy-to-follow instructional support designed for an in-home setting. Parents can find additional resources at christourlife.com.

Monitor Progress

After children complete each chapter, they can take that lesson's corresponding Interactive Chapter Review by scanning the QR code on the review page in the Student Book. This way children's understanding can be gauged and progress can be charted. Determine in advance the best way for parents to share the results of this assessment with you. Consider keeping a chart or spreadsheet on which you can track children's progress.

Choosing a Plan That Works for You

Christ Our Life Family Catechesis allows you to tailor the sequence of the presentations and chapters according to the needs of your program and the families. Decide which chapters will be taught at each group meeting and which chapters will be taught at home or at weekly sessions with a grade-level catechist.

The Four Pillars of the Catechism

Christ Our Life Family Catechesis was developed according to the four pillars of the Catechism of the Catholic Church and Missionary Discipleship. The implementation models on the following pages assume that this is the plan you will be following.

Page 34 of the Director Guide details how the chapters are grouped together at each grade. The first chapter of each group—designated "Lesson A"—is taught by grade-level catechists during the group meeting. The remaining four chapters of the part—designated "Lessons B–E"—are taught by parents at home, using the At-Home Editions. Thus, a total of five chapters are taught for each part of *Christ Our Life* Family Catechesis.

Christ Our Life Student Book

You may choose to follow the organization of the Student Book. When following this plan, you will need to keep careful track of what chapters are being covered at home and which chapters will be covered at each group meeting. You may also need to adjust the sequence of the presentations to better correspond with what is being covered at home.

The Liturgical Year

This plan calls for group meetings to correspond with the different seasons of the Church's liturgical year, thus allowing for year-round catechesis. During Ordinary Time, schedule the group meetings for Parts 1, 2, and 4. The group meeting for Part 3 can be scheduled during the season of Lent, while Part 5 is well-suited for the Easter season. You can follow the chapter groupings on page 34, or you may want to rearrange the sequence of chapters that make the most sense for your program.

Adult Faith Formation

Christ Our Life Family Catechesis can also be easily adapted to form parents and other adults, including adults in the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) who are preparing to celebrate the Sacraments of Initiation. Participants would come to an adult-only group meeting. You will need to adjust the script in the Leader Guide to reflect this. The Welcome section can be replaced with an icebreaker for parents to get to know one another.



Sample Planning Calendar

The following calendar can help you plan for the year. Decide which chapters are presented at group meetings and which chapters are presented in lessons by a catechist or at home by parents. If you decide to present the chapters according to the pillars of the Catechism, see page 34 for the grade-level chapter groupings and the correspoding lesson designations A-E. Implementation Models

The following pages provide suggestions for presenting the *Christ Our Life* Family Catechesis program according to the four pillars of the *Catechism*. These models can be easily adapted to fit the needs of your parish. **Please note: The lessons about Advent, Christmas, Lent, Holy Week, and Easter can be moved to coincide with their corresponding liturgical seasons.**

Implementation Model 1: School-Year Monthly Model

This model follows a typical faith formation year. Monthly group meetings are held nine times per year and last about an hour and 15 minutes. Seasonal group meetings take place at appropriate times during the year.

Implementation Model 2: Semester Model

This approach calls for seven meetings over 15 weeks. Encourage group attendance and participation at Mass during the weeks when group meetings are not scheduled. The semester model can also be used as a means for helping children whose faith formation has lapsed catch up to their grade-level peers.

Implementation Model 3: 10-Day Summer Intensive

The summer intensive program takes place over 10 days. Plan a parent orientation before the first 10-Day Summer Intensive meeting. See page 30 for a suggested parent orientation plan. Then parents and children will meet every other day for group meetings, following the same format described on page 12.

In this model, children will learn about the seasons in the church year through the lessons that appear in the Special Seasons and Lessons section at the back of the Student Book.

Methods and Models of Family Catechesis

Christ Our Life Family Catechesis is readily adaptable and complements many methods and models of family faith formation.

How These Models Work with Christ Our Life Family Catechesis
Christ Our Life Family Catechesis combines parish-based group meetings and grade-specific instruction led by trained catechists with at-home lessons guided by parents.
Children meet with trained catechists for grade-specific instruction. Monthly meetings bring parents and children together for the slideshow presentations.
Christ Our Life Family Catechesis uses professionally developed, catechetically sound, and well-paced slideshow presentations for each part that include links to multimedia resources.
Prayer is central to <i>Christ Our Life</i> Family Catechesis; it begins and ends each group meeting, helping build community and prayerful practice.
Children, their parents, and fellow participants take part in a sharing activity during the Welcome section of each meeting. Each group celebration centers on a family or group activity.
Missionary discipleship is fundamental to <i>Christ Our Life</i> Family Catechesis. Families are formed so that they can go forth as missionary disciples and share the truth and beauty of the Catholic faith with the world.
Group celebrations for Advent/Christmas and Lent/Holy Week/ Easter offer simple ways to carry out celebrations that build community, fellowship, and faith.
Consider sponsoring a family pilgrimage where families visit a holy place or sacred site together as an end-of-the year group celebration.
You may wish to make the seasonal lessons into family retreat days. Include time for prayer, reflection, discussion, and opportunities to build community among parish families and within the parish community. Ideas for retreats are available at loyolapress.com.
