COST Actions (https://www.cost.eu)

- A COST Action is an interdisciplinary research network that brings researchers and innovators together to investigate a topic of their choice for 4 years.
- COST Actions are typically made up of researchers from academia, SMEs, public institutions and other relevant organisations or interested parties.
- Open to all science and technology fields
- COST Actions offer an inclusive, pan-European environment for individuals of all levels of seniority to grow their professional research networks and boost their careers

Leading European Economics Associations and Societies (1 of 3)

- European Economic Association (EEA): EEA is one of Europe's foremost professional organizations dedicated to promoting the study of economics and fostering collaboration among researchers in the field. It organizes annual conferences and publishes research in the Journal of the European Economic Association. (Note: Reduced membership fee: 28 euro/year).
- Royal Economic Society (RES): Based in the UK, RES promotes economic research and scholarship. It organizes conferences, seminars, and publishes leading journals, including The Economic Journal and The Econometrics Journal.
- European Association for Research in Industrial Economics (EARIE): EARIE focuses on industrial economics and provides a platform for academics and practitioners to exchange ideas and collaborate on research. It organizes annual conferences and publishes research in industrial economics.





Leading European Economics Associations and Societies (2 of 3)

- European Association of Environmental and Resource Economists
 (EAERE): This association focuses on the economics of the environment and
 natural resources. It promotes research, organizes conferences, and publishes
 the Environmental and Resource Economics journal.
- Association for Comparative Economic Studies (ACES): ACES promotes
 the study of economic systems and institutions through comparative analysis,
 particularly in the context of transitional and emerging economies.
- European Public Choice Society (EPCS): EPCS is focused on public choice theory and the intersection of economics and political science. It promotes research on how political decision-making affects economic outcomes.
- European Society for Population Economics (ESPE): ESPE fosters
 research on population economics, including demographic trends and their
 economic implications. It organizes annual meetings and supports research
 dissemination in the field.





Leading European Economics Associations and Societies (3 of 3)

- European Finance Association (EFA): EFA promotes the development of financial economics in Europe and provides a forum for discussing finance-related research. It organizes the annual EFA conference, which brings together leading researchers in finance.
- International Economic Association (IEA): While global in scope, the IEA includes a strong European presence and facilitates cooperation among national economic associations worldwide. It organizes world congresses and publishes key research in economics.
- European Association of Labour Economists (EALE): EALE promotes
 labour economics research and facilitates interaction among labour
 economists in Europe. It organizes conferences and publishes the Journal of
 Labor Economics.



European Partnerships (1 of 3)

- Several European Partnerships are funded by the Horizon Europe programme (2021-2027).
- These partnerships bring together public and private entities to address pressing societal challenges and promote research and innovation across various sectors.
- These partnerships help align EU policies and national programmes while leveraging investments from both public and private sectors.



European Partnerships (2 of 3)

- Currently no European Partnerships explicitly focused on economics.
 However, economic research is often implicitly involved:
 - European Partnership on Artificial Intelligence, Data, and Robotics: Supports innovation in AI, data, and robotics to address societal challenges and drive economic growth.
 - Global Health EDCTP3 Partnership: Focuses on addressing infectious diseases, by strengthening research and innovation capabilities.
 - European Partnership for the Circular Bio-based Europe: Promotes the circular economy and bio-based industries, focusing on sustainability in the use of natural resources.



European Partnerships (3 of 3)

- Innovative Health Initiative (IHI): Aims to foster collaboration between industry, academia, and healthcare stakeholders to develop innovative solutions in health technologies.
- European Partnership for Sustainable Smart Mobility: Focuses on transforming mobility systems to make them more sustainable, digital, and connected.
- European Partnership for Innovative Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs): Supports innovation and collaboration among European SMEs, particularly in high-tech sectors.



EC Info-Days (1 of 1)

- However, some still take place physically in Brussels (or other European locations).










Objective

In addition to the almost 2bIn workers already active in the informal sector, World Bank and ILO estimate that the pandemic might have put at risk of precarious employment 500mln-1.5bIn more. These losses, and related consequences, are not evenly distributed given that Africa, Asia and Latin America is where 93% of the world's informal employment is located and where post-pandemic crisis is likely to hit harder (especially women, migrants and young people). Yet, the concern is global. Indeed, besides vulnerability and precariousness at individual and community levels, informality also eventually reduces state capacity and the ability of institutions to design and implement policies that properly address social, economic and environmental issues (i.e. SDGs) in a long term perspective. Accordingly, informality-related challenges have been devoted a great deal of attention and political statements. But seldom have these statements been followed by concrete instructions, guidelines or evidence-based policies to tackle informality across the world. Starting from this gap, PRESILIENT is a large network comprising 14 partners (of which 7 non-academic) and 15 associated partners located in Africa, Asia-Pacific and Latin America committed to delivering the a world class cross-regional training on informality in the Global South to: measure it, address it, find viable and sustainable alternatives. By doing this, we have committed to four main objectives:

- 0.1 train the next generation of experts on informality in the global south.
- 0.2 carry out a research spanning 15 different countries and to produce novel data and significant theoretical advancements in the field.
- 0.3 produce strategic intelligence that can be used to provide practical policy recommendations
- 0.4 enable multi-directional knowledge transfer through network events, pairing of academic and non-academic partners (who will jointly supervise each fellow), secondment and task-based teamwork.










Horizon Europe Dashboard (1 of 1)







 - 181-pages.








5. Conclusions
