Assistant Coaches

Designate a counselor as the NCAA counselor or a coach to be the Academic Coach who will ensure kids are taking the right classes with the right teachers and on track to graduate & attend a 4 year college.

- Worksheets for college coaches to eliminate them having to do the worksheets on each player.
- Get it engrained in each player that going to college is not an option but a necessity.

Major Points Of Emphasis

- There are a fixed number of scholarships
- There are a fixed number of deserving athletes
- Very few athletes get football scholarships. Even fewer receive scholarships at the Division 1 Level (FBS & FCS).
- GPA + Ability = Potential Scholarship
 - There is nothing the school, coach, player, university or anyone else can do to aid a student in getting a scholarship WITHOUT the requisite GPA

Divisions In College Football

- NCAA Division I FBS (Football Bowl Subdivision)
 - Formally known as Division 1A
- NCAA Division I FCS (Football Championship Subdivision)
 - Formally known as Division 1-AA
- NCAA Division II
- NCAA Division III
- NAIA
- Junior College

Include number of teams at each level

Divisions In College Football

- NCAA Division I
 - Larger Budgets
 - Elaborate Facilities
 - Higher numbers of athletic scholarships
- NCAA Division I FBS vs. Division I FCS
 - Attendance numbers
 - Number of scholarships available

Divisions In College Football

- Division I FBS (Division IA)
 - 85 full scholarships available
 - 128 teams
 - Post season bowl games
 - Champions of the 6 major conferences play in BCS bowl games (Rose, Sugar, Fiesta, Orange)
 - BCS National Championship Game

Divisions In College Football

- Division I FCS (Division 1AA)
 - 63 full scholarships available
 - » Can be divided into partial scholarships to get a maximum of 85 players receiving aid.
 - 124 teams. Some conferences are non scholarship.

Patriot League – Lafayette, Lehigh, Bucknell, Georgetown, Colgate, Holy Cross

- Athletes can qualify for financial aid
- 24 team elimination tournament to determine National Champion

Divisions In College Football

Division II

- 36 full scholarships available
 - Most schools divide scholarships into partials
- 149 teams.
- Smaller public universities, some private
- Not all D2 schools will be fully funded
- Financial aid available
- Division I transfers



Divisions In College Football

Division III

- 244 teams.
- No scholarships available. All financial need based. Academic money available at some schools
- Non revenue making
- No scholarships available. All financial need based. Academic money available at some schools

Divisions In College Football

Junior College

- For players who fail to qualify for a 4 year college or do not get recruited coming out of high school.
- Provides opportunity to earn Associate's Degree while playing football.
- Provides opportunity to attend a 4 year college and continue playing football after completing an Associate's Degree
- Many JC's offer scholarships (some states excluded)

Academic Requirements

- Core Courses
 - English, Math, Social Science, Physical/Natural Science, Foreign Languages
 - Rancho Verde High School approved list of NCAA core courses
- Division I 16 core courses
- Division II 16 core courses
- Division III Must meet schools admission standards
- Junior College Must have High School Diploma/ GED and take entrance exams.

NCAA Eligibility Center

- Determines an athlete's eligibility to compete in college athletics.
 - Register online at end of Junior year <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u> or via mail
- Core GPA vs. Sliding SAT/ACT Scale
 - Division 1
 - Div 1Qualifier: Core GPA 2.3 and above with Sliding Scale
 - Div 1 Academic Redshirt: Core GPA 2.0-2.29 with Sliding Scale
 - Division II
 - Full Qualifier 2.0 Core GPA & 820 SAT score along with all required courses completed.
 - Partial Qualifier Completion of required courses.
 - 2.0 GPA or 820 SAT
 - May only practice with team

NCAA Div 1 Requirements

- 4 Years of English
- 3 Years of Math (Algebra I or Higher)
- 2 Years of Natural/Physical Science(1 Lab)
- 1 Year of Additional English/Math/Science
- · 2 Years of Social Studies
- 4 Years of Additional Core Courses (Any of the above or foreign language)
- = 16 Total Core Course Required

Division 2 Core Requirements

- 3 Years of English
- 2 Years of Math (Algebra I or Higher)
- 2 Years of Natural/Physical Science (1 Lab)
- 1 Year each of Additional English/Math/Science
- · 2 Years of Social Studies
- 4 Years of Additional Core Classes (Any of the areas above or foreign language)
- = 16 Total Core Classes Required

Division 2 Requirements

- There is no sliding SAT scale!
- Core grade-point average must be at least
 2.000.
- Minimum test score must be at least <u>820</u> on SAT or sum score of <u>68</u> on ACT.

NAIA Requirements

- Students must register with the NAIA eligibility center (playnaia.org).
- Students must meet 2 out of the 3 requirements:
 - Achieve a minimum of 860 on the SAT or a 18 on the SAT.
 - Achieve a minimum of a 2.0 GPA
 - Graduate in the top half of your high school class.

Player's Role

ACADEMIC RESPONSIBILITIES

- Concentrate on academics!
 - Letter Grade of "C" or above in core classes
- Consider summer school and retaking classes during school year to improve Core GPA if necessary
- Take SAT/ACT in Spring Junior Year
- Avoid missing any school days and any football functions!



Player's Role

• PHYSICAL PREPARATION:

- Train like you have never trained before.
 - Train hard in Weight Class
 - Work on positional drills daily
 - Practice Combine Drills
 - Work with a personal training service if financial funds are available.

Player's Role

- Attend Combine & College Camps.
 - Attend Combines run through SPARQ training.
 - Attend College Camps to expose yourself to coaching staffs.
 - Attend "One Day" camps in order to expose yourself to the most colleges for the least amount of money.



Parent's Role

- Communicate with your child
 - Know what schools he is interested in and who is interested in him.
 - Know their academic standings and have an open channel of dialog with all of your child's teachers.
 - Keep them focused and grounded throughout.
- Look at finances to determine what type of school is affordable.
 - Fill out the FAFSA forms in January.
- Discuss distance
- Take day/weekend trips to colleges this Spring/Summer
- Sign up for SAT/ACT as soon as possible
- Keep in touch with the Rancho Verde coaching staff.
 - Know what they know.
 - Express any issues or concerns you may have.

Coach's Role

- Identify potential college athletes.
- Create player profiles.
- Create Core GPA profiles & Transcripts.
- Create and copy highlight/game films.
- Provide honest assessment to recruiters and parents.
- Help expose players thru Combines, Camps, and off-season competition.
- · Log contact information.
- Serve as middle man between player & college.

Avoid The Following

- Taking the Recruitment process into your own hands.
 - Recruiters look down on parents and players that are going around the high school coaches.

• Recruiting Services:

- High School Coaches word is most important to College Recruiters.
- Should never have to pay to get your son recruited.
- Can't offer anymore than we can.
- Most will do the same that you and your coach can do on your own.

Recruiting Timeline

• High School Athletes:

- Ensure you are working hard to get the best grades possible.
- Ensure you are taking NCAA approved classes.
- Register with <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u> at beginning of soph year.
- Register to take SAT &/or ACT during Junior Year. May take it as many times as you wish.

Recruiting Timeline

- January April
 - Colleges make initial contact with coaches via phone calls and mail
 - High school coach fills out information postcards and forms to send back to colleges
 - High school coach makes calls on behalf of player as a follow up to information sent
 - Game and Highlight film are sent out to colleges across the country.

Recruiting Timeline

- May
 - Evaluation Period for Colleges
 - » College coaches continue evaluation of film and decide on early scholarship offers
 - » Coaches will begin to visit schools and meet players face-to-face
 - » Invitations to attend summer camps to possible scholarship players
 - » Attend Combines such as Nike & Rivals Combines

Recruiting Timeline

• June - August

- Register with the <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u> if you have not already done so.
- Ask Counselor to send transcript to the eligibility center.
- Attend college camps (can attend early in high school career)
- Visit colleges that you have interest in
- High school players focus on summer workouts

Recruiting Timeline

• September-November

- Weekly phone calls from coaches
- Some visits to high schools
- Scholarship offers may go out
- Senior film may be requested
- Official or Unofficial visits may be taken
- List of schools gets narrowed down
- Players focus stays on TEAM

Recruiting Timeline

• December- January

- Official visits are taken
- FAFSA information is made available
- Phone calls and visits become more frequent
- Decision about school is nearing but not definite
- Many Division II & Division III schools increase their recruiting efforts
 - » Trickle Down Effect

Recruiting Timeline

February

• Signing Day – first Wednesday in February



- » Player may or may not have decision made by then
- » Visits can be taken after signing day
- » Decision may be pending on admittance or FAFSA information
- » Decision to play football may not be finalized until April-May.
