DAAA Region 1-A Community Impact in FY 2018:

97,441 people received DAAA services during FY 2017 – FY 2018.

80,988 people provided with supportive services.

12,035 seniors are healthier with liquid nutrition meals.

4,418 people are more independent with care management and in home services.

Senior employment

66 eligible low and moderate-income seniors served and provided 63,000 hours of service to 23 agencies serving seniors, youth and caregivers DAAA carried a 78.6% job placement rate.

Seniors in Region 1-A Face More Challenges with Fewer Resources

Premature Death

Dying Before Their Time Studies commissioned by DAAA document that seniors in Region 1-A are twice as likely to die prematurely versus their cohorts in the remainder of Michigan.

- \$77.9M In federal, state and local funding helped older adults, caregivers and dual-eligible participants in FY 2018. About \$10 million dollars of these funds can be attributed to Older Americans Act and Older Michiganians Act funding. Funding is expected to be reduced by \$500,000 per year through 2022 due to slower population growth.
- 809,703 Meals were served to 12,035 seniors through 23 congregate meals at sites, home-delivered meals, holiday meals, veterans meals, Nutrition Services Incentive Program meals and Friends of Detroit Meals on Wheels.
- 39,690 Older adults and caregivers were connected to community health and wellness services to maintain their health and manage chronic illnesses and conditions.
- 36,876 Seniors linked to supportive services and nursing facility care through information and assistance, outreach and long-term care Ombudsman services.
 - 6,422 Seniors were served by DAAA's provider network through specialized services, adult day services, caregiver education, training and support, legal services and outreach and assistance to seniors and caregivers.
 - **4,000** Individuals frequenting four Community Wellness Service Centers (CWSCs) supported by DAAA were provided with an array of services that promote socialization and lifestyle behavior change.
 - 1,525 Individuals participated in Elder Abuse Awareness and Prevention workshops and presentations.

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
